

STEWARDSHIP SHARING

"Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared ..." ~ Nehemiah 8:10 ~

Ezra's instructions to the people show us that God does not forbid us from enjoying the good things in life. He wants us to be happy! However, God expects us to be grateful for all that He has given us and through our <u>Stewardship</u> to generously share our blessings with those who are in need. Now here's the hard part – to share all we have without expecting anything in return.



Dear Parishioners,

We place a great premium on reading in our society, and rightly so. Many toddlers' games are geared toward learning the alphabet and recognizing words. Computer programs teach reading to youngsters and speed reading to people of all ages. Yes, reading is important. Yet, are there any childhood games that teach *hearing*? Are there any computer programs that sharpen one's hearing? In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus reads aloud to the people in the Nazareth synagogue. The hearers must have *heard*, for after Jesus' proclamation in the synagogue, they "looked intently at Him." What were they expecting from Jesus? An explanation of what they just heard, yes. But Jesus moves His hearers beyond receiving mere explanation of the word to encountering Him as the Word Made Flesh.

The synagogue hearers' expectations were fulfilled in two (2) ways: <u>hearing</u> God's Word and <u>encountering</u> God's Word in the very person of Jesus. In the very proclamation, Jesus also announces His saving mission: to meet the needs of the poor, the captives, the blind, and the oppressed. He identifies Himself with the word that makes a difference, changes lives, and fulfills expectations. Jesus' word is an active word that brings to life the "glad tidings" of God's care for us. Our own hearing and encountering the Word today invites us to participate in these saving deeds as, through us, the Word continues to be made flesh.

Just as the people in Nehemiah's time listened intently as Ezra proclaimed the law, the people in today's Gospel focus on Jesus in the synagogue. Their intense anticipation is met by Jesus' dramatic assertion that the Scripture passage from Isaiah "is fulfilled" in their hearing. In the First Reading, Ezra read from the book of the law. In the Gospel, Jesus <u>is</u> the book, the Good News, the Word Made Flesh. Ezra interpreted what he read. In the Gospel, Jesus Himself <u>is</u> the interpretation. Ezra's word was an inspiring word that had power and moved the people to worship and praise. Jesus' Word is a creative word fulfilled **in Him** and continues in the Gospel, where **we ourselves** encounter Jesus and are moved to be disciples. The feasting, joy, and new strength on the holy day when Ezra read the law are now fulfilled in a new order in which the feasting is on Jesus and the strength comes from our sharing in the same Spirit.

Jesus is enfleshed today in the lives of those who encounter Him, the Gospel's very fulfillment, throughout the ages. Now we – our own lives – announce the meaning of the Word proclaimed and enfleshed. We can do so because, like Jesus, in our Baptism, we also have been anointed with the Spirit. By our Baptism, we have received a share in Jesus' saving deeds. As His followers, we make present His saving mystery.

Living the Paschal Mystery means that we continually look for the poor, captive, blind, and oppressed among us. We don't have to look very far! "Today this passage has been fulfilled" is now true only when we respond to those around us who need a nourishing, strengthening, joyful word. This means that God's Word isn't something we hear only on the weekend at Mass, but it becomes a living Word in our hearts, inspiring us to be living Gospels in our very selves. As we gradually grow into being anointed by the Spirit, we, like Jesus, are the fulfillment of the Scriptures.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Do you ever find yourself feeling like you are at the cusp of something remarkable? Like you are witnessing an incredible, historic, athletic, or aeronautical feat? I wonder if that's what it was like for the followers of Jesus when he began his public ministry: "News of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all." In today's Gospel, Jesus reads the words of the prophet Isaiah that are effectively a "job description" of his mission: glad tidings to the poor, liberty of captives, sight to the blind, freedom for the oppressed. What Isaiah prophesied, Jesus claims to fulfill. He thus inaugurates his public ministry with a claim that is straightforward, bold, true, and of great consequence. Today, by virtue of our baptism, we are part of the body of Christ and share in that mission. Whatever our backgrounds, abilities, or talents, we each have something to contribute to building up one another and the Church. And with the help of the Holy Spirit, we, too, can be bold in our own proclamation of Jesus Christ as Lord.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We've heard the phrase "Don't sell yourself short." Social media aside, many of us tend to focus on our shortcomings: We may wish we could run faster, be better at our jobs, have a cleaner home, in general, "get it together!" Truth is, we're all works in progress. That's what I love about Paul's Letter to the Corinthians. He reminds us that each one of us - whatever our strengths or weaknesses - is part of the body of Christ. God loves us with our imperfections, not in spite of them. As such, each of us has indispensable value and much to contribute to the mission of the Church. As we move into the week ahead, today's readings invite us to place ourselves at the service of the Church and one another. Beyond that, we can invite others to join us by recognizing that God values the talents - and foibles - that each of us brings to his service.








MAR SIGNS OF A VOCATION
