



Due to your generosity, the parish food pantry continues to provide assistance to our neighbors here in Clayton and Franklin Township. If you would like to help by contributing nonperishable items, you may place these donations in the pantry shopping cart which is located in the entranceway of Nativity Church or, if you prefer, you may bring them directly to the pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center From 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday Mornings. Since we cannot allow you inside the pantry at this time, there will be a bench outside the entrance on which you may leave your donations. We will periodically come outside and retrieve the items, but feel free to honk your horn before driving away if you wish to alert us of your presence.

At this time, we especially need 1 pound or 2 pound bags or boxes of rice as well as rice mixes such as Knorr's Rice Sides or Rice-a-Roni. Any of the following items are also welcome: pasta sauce, pasta, mac & cheese, canned macaroni meals such as Chef Boyardee, canned fruit, applesauce, canned tomatoes, canned vegetables, boxes or packets of instant potatoes, tuna, canned chicken, cereal, peanut butter and jelly. Non-food items such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, toilet tissue, and soap also make nice extras.



### Dear Parishioners,

We can't buy our way into the Kingdom of Heaven – we must work our way into it! The "work" we must do is 'active-waiting' while we remain open to God's call and responding generously whenever and wherever that call comes. In this weekend's Gospel, a most generous landowner is sensitive to the plight of others as he hires day laborers for his vineyard. Presumably at dawn when he first went out to hire laborers, he would have hired everyone he thought he would need for the day ... but he goes out four (4) other times throughout the day and hires additional laborers because they were "standing idle." In God's Kingdom, there is no cause for idleness, no limit on "wages," and no reason to regard waiting as an unproductive effort.

The workers, like the landowner, are persistent. Instead of giving up and going home, they remain in the marketplace seemingly "standing idle." Actually, their idleness was not simply doing nothing – theirs was an active waiting. These workers persistently remain ready and willing to work. Of such is the "Kingdom of Heaven." The "Kingdom of Heaven" consists of those who persist in awaiting God's recurring call, and who respond willingly no matter what hour the call comes. The last are first not because of the number of hours that they work, but because of their openness to God's call no matter when it comes and their faithful response. The "Kingdom of Heaven" subsists in persistent openness, active waiting, and faithful responding. The laborer's wage is beyond monetary expectation – it is salvation.

In this Gospel parable, the landowner's behavior is remarkable in two (2) ways: his care for idle workers not able to put their skills and energy to good use, and his manner of paying wages. His behavior describes aptly the Kingdom of Heaven. God calls each of us to use whatever our gifts are to advance the growth of the Kingdom. God "pays" us not in dollars and cents, but with the free gift of salvation, which is immeasurable, unlimited, endless, and overflowing. Yes, in God's Kingdom there is no cause for idleness, no limit on "wages," and no reason to regard waiting as an unproductive effort.

We might think that the Gospel landowner is just to those he called first and generous to those he called last. In fact, our gracious and saving Landowner-God is both just and generous to all of the laborers simply because the divine "wages" are always a free gift, undeserved, and more than we can earn or expect. God's "wages" are a share in the divine Life.

Most of us think of work as a necessity. We need a paycheck to pay the bills, buy the necessities, and maybe have a bit left over for some entertainment. This parable invites us to think of work in a different way. By our labors we are building up God's Kingdom, spreading God's reign in our world, "earning" our salvation. God calls us to be laborers in the divine vineyard – a call we first answer at Baptism and then continually answer throughout our lives each time we say yes to the divine call, reach out to others in imitation of God's goodness and generosity, and cooperate with all that God asks of us. This divine, saving "work" is a privilege – we actually share in God's saving deeds! God uses us to bring salvation to the world. This work has a great dignity about it. This work is a privilege. This work is a lifelong response to God's invitation to be His laborers.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe! Have a great week!

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today's parable about the workers in the vineyard reminds me of a popular paraphrase of a famous Theodore Roosevelt quote, "Envy is the thief of iov." No matter how much or how little we have, we can find someone who appears better off or happier, or appears to have received more than they deserve. Take, for example, the vineyard workers in today's Gospel. Those who arrived first for work were upset and envious, because the last to arrive were the first to be paid - and they were paid the same wages as those who had been first to arrive. Envy robbed the all-day workers of joy: joy in a job well-done and being paid the just wage due to them; joy in celebrating the generosity of the landowner, and of living in the kingdom of heaven begun here on earth, content with and grateful for everything God has provided for each one of us. Although envy may indeed be the thief of joy, joy can be ours when we appreciate what we have and quit comparing ourselves to others. It also frees us to share our gifts and truly walk with others through the ups and downs of our lives as we work together in God's vineyard.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's parable has me thinking: When I feel envious of another's good fortune (sparkling clean house, teenaged boys who smile for photos), perhaps one way to counter that would be to talk through those feelings with God: "Help me be content with what I have. Thank you for the ways you have blessed my friends and me, and for the people in my life who hold me up in good times and bad." Just as the landowner was generous with the laborers, and God is immensely generous with us, let us make an effort this week to be generous in sharing the gifts in our lives with others. When we radiate gratitude and joy in our daily lives as Jesus' disciples, and let the Holy Spirit work through us in leading others to him, our witness to others will bear much fruit.







ACTION Make a list of the gifts in our lives: Health, family, sparkly new earrings, a shiny lawn mower, you name it. Next, choose a "gift" you can share with others, and be specific: "I will make a card for Grandma today." "I will donate (fill in the blank) to the food and clothing pantry on Monday." "I will volunteer to be a greeter at Mass every other Sunday."
