

Is Online Giving Safe?

Online Giving meets the highest banking-level security standards set forth by the Payment Card Industry (PCI) to ensure safe and confidential transactions. In fact, your banking information is encrypted in the system and is not accessible to any users or administrators of the Online Giving system. When you manage your own account information, your church never needs to handle checks or worry about locking up documents containing your account information. And you'll always be certain that your gifts are direct-deposited into your church's account.

What are the advantages of Online Giving?

It makes it easy to give, even when you are unable to attend church. You never have to bring cash or checks to church. Giving electronically also helps the church save money and plan its budget!

How my contributions are automatically deducted from my account?

Once you complete the online registration form, the contribution amount you specify will automatically be transferred from your bank account to the church's bank account.

When will my contribution be deducted from my account?

Your electronic contribution will be debited on the date you specify on the "My Gifts" page of the Online Giving system.

If I do not write checks, how do I keep my checkbook balance straight?

Since your contribution is made at a pre-established time, you simply record it in your check register on the appropriate date. Electronic contributions are recorded for you on your bank statement as well as your online reports.

Without a canceled check, how can I prove I made my contribution?

Your bank statement and the Online Giving system both provide reports that document your electronic transactions.

Can I put different amounts in offerings and have all of them withdrawn at different times?

You can contribute to different offerings at different times; however, you will have to do each one separately. You will receive a receipt for each one.

What if I change bank accounts?

Log in and update your account information in the My Payment Methods window. Each checking/savings can be changed using the edit button, deleted completely, or new accounts can be added on the right side of the screen.

How much does Online Giving cost?

It costs you absolutely nothing! The parish pays the transactions fees charged by the company.

What if I try Online Giving and don't like it?

You can cancel your authorization by cancelling your gifts and donation dates at any time.

Something to consider ...

This is the eighth day of the fifty days of Easter. Every one of those days celebrates the Divine Mercy that reaches out to save the world, and of which we become ministers of faith through the Sacraments of Christian Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist, & Confirmation). How will you renew your baptismal promises this Easter to be people of mercy?

SUNDAY OF DIVINE MERCY

Dear Parishioners,



The popularity of roller coasters at amusement parks, haunted houses at Halloween, and horror shows at movie theaters all attest to the fact that sometimes we like the thrill of a good fright. Fear overtakes us when we perceive mortal harm, face the unknown, or encounter what is utterly different and threatening. When the fear is caused by temporary or unreal situations such as those mentioned above, our fears are quickly allayed. We climb out of the roller coaster car with our stomach back where it belongs. We emerge from the haunted house all in one piece. We leave the theater to re-enter familiar and safe surroundings. A sense of well-being and peace comes over us as we laugh at the entertaining good time and its now dissipated fears. Sometimes, however, the fears are real and not so easily swept away, like the fear of the Disciples in this weekend's Gospel. They were well-aware of Jesus' fate. Their fears were well-grounded. The locked doors were a sensible protection. Unlike the peace we make in the face of roller coasters, haunted houses, or horror shows, the Disciples could not make their own peace. They had no power. *Did they?*

And as we have now entered the second month of COVID-19 isolation, we, too, have our sensible protections: stay at home, wash your hands A LOT, facemasks ... will we ever look at our familiar surroundings in the same way again? Will we be able to wipe away our fears? Will we be able to make our own peace?

Into this scene filled with palpable fear, the risen Lord appears, and three (3) times He addresses the gathered Disciples, "*Peace be with you*." What is this peace He brings? It is a peace that allays fears, empowers forgiveness, and prompts us to accept the reality of suffering and death as doorways to new life. The peace Jesus brings prompts us to face death rather than cower from it. The peace Jesus brings prompts us to set right our relationships. This peace is new life ... the Spirit breathed into us by the risen Lord. It is not a peace we can make for ourselves. It is a peace that is the gift of the risen Lord.

Peace is the wholeness and well-being of the gift of the Spirit breathed upon us and dwelling within us. This peace bestows on us the life and power of Jesus Himself, and with it we can make a difference in our world. We can establish God's reign. We can continue Jesus' ministry of bringing salvation to all. The condition of this gift of peace, however, is belief. Belief is not merely an exercise in intellectual consent, but a commitment of self to acceptance of the Life that is given us. We know <u>to whom and to what</u> our belief is directed: <u>to Jesus and the gift of new life</u>. We know <u>how</u> we receive new life: <u>through Jesus' gift of the breath of the Holy Spirit</u> dwelling within us. We know the <u>fruit</u> of this new life: peace and forgiveness.

Our greeting of others must also be one of peace since we, too, share in the Lord's risen life. As with the Disciples, Jesus allays our fears and offers us a whole new relationship with Him – not one where we need to touch His wounds, like Thomas, but one in which we utter with joyful conviction, "My Lord and my God!" We also enter into a whole new relationship with each other as we continue the works of Jesus that lead others to believing. These works include forgiveness, yes, but also caring for others, accepting them for who they are, easing pain and suffering. Any good we do brings new life ... brings risen life ... to others. Our ministry of goodness brings salvation. We are empowered to do so through the Holy Spirit. All we need to do is surrender to God's action within us. We have the fifty days of Easter to come to greater belief ... deepen our relationships ... forgive ... spread peace. We have our whole lifetime to manifest the good works of our belief.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families continue to be well and safe!

SINCE I CANNOT NOW RECEIVE YOU SACRAMENTALLY.


COME AT LEAST SPIRITUALLY INTO MY HEART.


