GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Imagine being in Peter's shoes. We have listened to the Sermon on the Mount and been comforted and sometimes challenged by Jesus' teachings. We have watched him heal the sick and forgive sinners. We've faltered at times and seen Jesus face down skeptics. Then Jesus turns to us and asks: "Who do you say that I am?" How would we answer? Peter, not yet knowing that Jesus will suffer, die, and rise, proclaims: "You are Christ, the Son of the Living God." For Peter, this would be the beginning; he would devote his life to building up the Church. Centuries later, we proclaim his words in the Nicene Creed that Jesus is the Son of God. As with Peter, this is just our starting point. Knowing who Jesus is compels us to devote our lives to building up the kingdom of God on earth.



GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We know more about learning styles now, but most of us can remember two kinds of students: The front-row students who shot up their hand before a teacher finished asking the question ("Call on me, please!"), and the back-row kids who avoided eye contact, wishing they were invisible. Peter seems to have been one of those front-row students. When Jesus asked, "Who do you say that I am?" he didn't hesitate. If Jesus asked that question today, would we hold back, check Google, or speak boldly as Peter did? As Jesus goes on to say, God put those words in Peter's heart. God speaks to us, too, through the Scriptures, silent prayer, and the examples of saintly men and women who have touched our lives. We don't have to worry about being "called on," but we are all called to answer by sharing Jesus' saving message with those around us. Like Peter, none of us is perfect; we don't have to be. If we open our hearts and minds to Jesus and his words, we, too, can build up the Church through service, welcome, and generosity.

PRAY Jesus, you called and chose Peter, with his strengths and his weaknesses, to be the rock on which your Church was built. You call and choose me, with my unique strengths and weaknesses, to build your kingdom in the world I live in today. Fill me with your Holy Spirit and help me to speak boldly as Peter did, proclaiming your Good News to the world. Amen.



Dear Parishioners,

Hearsay or gossip is repeating what someone has heard from another. It is not permitted in court testimony because it is not eyewitness. So, the truth of what another has said who is not present cannot be proven. Its reliability cannot be cross-examined. Court testimony requires the presence of a person who can be questioned and challenged. What the witness says must not only be true, but the witness must have a commitment to what is being told. Otherwise, very quickly, the lawyers can unravel the story and prove the witness unreliable, blowing the case wide-open. Think about that next time someone tells you something that sounds a little sketchy. This weekend's Gospel, on the other hand, involves the disciples as witnesses to Jesus' identity. Jesus does not let the case rest on their hearsay response. He wants truth, revelation, and commitment.

In answer to Jesus' query about His identity, the disciples tell Jesus what <u>others</u> are saying about Him. Their answer is based on hearsay. This is not good enough and does not get at the heart of who Jesus is. Jesus is not simply initiating an open discussion. He is leading the disciples to personal understanding and profession of who He is. Peter arrives there when he acclaims, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Each of us must come to this same personal profession about who Jesus is. Each of us must move beyond what others have told us about Jesus to a personal encounter with Him that brings us to awe and wonder of who He is ... the Messiah who has come to save us.

Together, we are the Church that is that community of individuals who have come personally to know who Jesus is and have chosen personally to make Jesus known to the world. Jesus Himself will lead us there through our personal encounters with Him. The building of the Church begins with Peter but continues through the ages with all those who profess who Jesus is. The netherworld will not prevail against the Church to the extent that the community of believers is united in its profession of who Jesus is, is committed to spreading the Good News revealed to us and is open to encountering Jesus in new and surprising ways. That Jesus is the Son of Man, the Son of the Living God, the Christ, the long-awaited Messiah is a truth that cannot be broadcast by hearsay. It must be declared by those who are eyewitnesses to the Presence of Jesus in His Church and are committed enough to profess who He is with openness and truth.

Jesus didn't only choose great thinkers or saintly people to steer His Church on a right course and make His name known. He chose ordinary human beings who simply open themselves to the capacity to be great believers because they are first great hearers of the revelation.

"Revelation" doesn't mean that we sit around alone in silence waiting for God to speak to us. It means that we open our eyes to see, our ears to hear, and our hearts to experience Jesus' Presence and power in daily happenings around us. The infant who utters their word and delights parents, a person with Alzheimer's who has a rare moment of recognition, or the unexpected good deed that comes our way can all be revelations of Jesus' identity and saving power. We only need to pay attention to the experience, recognize it for what it is, and receive the gift that has been given to us.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe! Have a great week!

Holy Days of Obligation ...

... Some Info

- 1 November 2020 <u>The Solemnity of All Saints</u> is celebrated on Sunday with the possibility of anticipated Masses on Saturday evening. This Solemnity takes precedence over the celebration of the Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time.
- 8 December 2020 <u>The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary</u> (National and Diocesan Patronal Feast) is celebrated on Tuesday with the possibility of anticipated Masses on Monday evening.
- **25 December 2020** <u>The Solemnity of the Nativity of Our Lord</u> is celebrated on Friday with the possibility of anticipated Masses on Thursday evening.
- **1 January 2021** <u>The Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God</u> is celebrated on Friday with the possibility of anticipated Masses on Thursday evening.
- 13 May 2021 The Solemnity of the Ascension of Our Lord is celebrated on the Thursday following the Sixth Sunday of Easter, with the possibility of Vigil Masses on Wednesday evening.

There are many regions of the United States where the celebration of the Ascension of Our Lord has been transferred to the following Sunday, replacing the Seventh Sunday of Easter. New Jersey and Pennsylvania are not among those regions.

15 August 2021 – The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated on Sunday, taking precedence over the Sunday in Ordinary time.

When this Solemnity occurs on a Saturday or a Monday, it remains a Solemnity, but the obligation to participate in Mass is removed.
