

Would you like to donate to our parish food pantry during this holiday season? Nonperishable items may be placed in the shopping cart located in the Gathering Space of Nativity Church or, if you prefer, you may bring them directly to the pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center from 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday mornings. Since we cannot allow you inside the pantry at this time, there will be a bench outside the entrance on which you may leave your donations. We will periodically come outside and retrieve the items, but feel free to honk your horn before driving away if you wish to alert us of your presence.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today, we acknowledge and celebrate Christ the King. It's hard to put this royal image together with today's Gospel passage, where Jesus is not asking to be treated like a king, but rather instructing us to perform merciful deeds for the least of his brothers and sisters. Yet it is the perfect follow-on to the previous three Sundays' Scriptures, where Jesus tells us what it means to live a life of holiness, preparation, and faithful investment in the Kingdom. Now we see what awaits those of us who turn over our lives to him, seeing the face of Jesus in the least among us - the poor, the imprisoned, the thirsty, the stranger. "Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."



ACTIONS

Choose one corporal work of mercy today and act on it. What does it look like to "visit the sick"? Donate blood; make food for someone who isn't feeling well; check in on an elderly neighbor.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I confess that judgment day readings scare me a little. Some days I behave more like a "goat" than a "sheep." Side note: After a deep dive into the Internet (did you know that sheep have 54 chromosomes and goats have 60?), I've concluded that Jesus isn't talking about farm animals here. He's talking about us humans and the choices we make or don't make through sins of omission. The list seems endless if I focus on all the things I could be doing to help others each and every day. Yet, rather than getting caught up in fear or guilt, today's readings encourage me, and remind me, that Jesus has told us what we need to do to be counted as "sheep" on the last day.



Do you know some "sheep" - people who radiate faith and kindness to others? Just as you might network with a professional in your field, invite that person out for coffee. Ask them about their faith and how it inspires them in their daily lives.

Christ the King November 22, 2020



Dear Parishioners,

Seeing can be a physical activity of the eyes or an inspired activity of the heart. We might see with our eyes the worried look of a parent caring for a sick child ... our inspired heart sees love and compassion pouring out. We might see with our eyes a student struggling to get through school ... our inspired heart sees potential for creativity and insight beyond book-learning. We might see with our eyes the run-down condition of a neighborhood ... our inspired heart sees the inner beauty of downtrodden people desiring a better life. We might see with our eyes the homeless ... our inspired heart sees hopelessness reaching out for understanding. We might see with our eyes they hungry, the thirsty, strangers, the naked, the ill, the imprisoned, the lonely, the abandoned, the elderly, the dying ... our inspired heart sees the Person of Christ the King in each of them crying out to be touched by the Person of Christ our King who dwells within each of us. This weekend's Gospel and the Solemnity invites us to draw on the strength of Christ who dwells within us to reach out to Christ in the other. This Gospel is about future judgment and it is even more about present discipleship.

So much about the Gospel this weekend speaks to us of Christ's glory and power ("When the Son of Man comes in His glory," "all the nations will be assembled before Him," "the king will say") and rightfully it should. However, there is a remarkable surprise in the Gospel. Christ is victorious, to be sure. He is King enthroned, to be sure. He judges all nations, to be sure. The surprise is that on this festival honoring Jesus Christ the King, both the Gospel and the First Reading from the Prophet Ezekiel speak about others who need our help and caring for them. We honor Christ the King by acknowledging that He is in the other and within us. No greater honor can we give our Savior King than to serve Him in one another. In a sense, then, our focus on each other is really a focus on Christ – for it is a measure of how much we imitate His care for others. It is a measure of how much we are His faithful disciples. He showed us by His very life how to care for others. We have to follow His example.

Christ the King <u>will</u> come "in His glory." It is not "<u>if</u>" He will come, but "<u>when</u>." There is an imperative in the immediacy of this "when." The Gospel claim is clear. Christ the King, arrayed in all His glory, is present <u>now</u> in the other. We must look beyond what we see with our eyes and see with the heart of Jesus Christ ... we must see others as He sees them. His throne is the person of the other ... He dwells within them. The "when" of His coming is now. The Kingdom of God is now. The judgment is now. In our care for others, here and now, Christ the King, reigns.

One of the best ways that we can begin to see the Christ in the other is by not judging the negative aspects of their persons first, but instead looking for the good in the other. This can be carried out in such a simple Christian practice as seeking always to compliment rather than to criticize another. Take care that we don't spread gossip or slander is another way. If we can do that, we build up the Body of Christ and bring honor to Christ our King who dwells in ourselves and in the other. By doing so, we'll see the face of Christ our King in everyone we meet. Perhaps the first and most important task of being good subjects of Christ the King is to live as He did – not simply by seeing with the eyes but seeing with hearts responding to the dignity of others, by responding to their need for healing, forgiveness, reconciliation, compassion, mercy, and love.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe! Have a great week!

THE 2021 MASS BOOK OPENS TUESDAY, DECEMBER 1, 2020 AT 10:00A

We have revised our Mass times beginning in January while maintaining our policy regarding requests for Mass Intentions. Individuals may initially request ten (10) Masses, [eight (8) weekday and two (2) weekend]. Beginning January 4, 2021, individuals can request additional weekday Masses and after the weekends for the second half of the year open on April 25, 2021, an additional three (3) weekend Masses may be requested. Hopefully, this will accommodate requests such as an anniversary of a person's passing, a special birthday, or a similar intention which could be planned in advance. At the same time, we hoped this would also allow for more immediate requests which arise at a particular time for special prayers (i.e. for someone undergoing surgery, or when someone dies, or a similar life-event). We would also like to be able to offer families weekend Masses if their loved one passes later in the year.

Over the past year, there have been a number of open intentions during the week. Please note: <u>A weekday Mass offers the same graces for the person it is offered for as does a weekend Mass</u>.

- Anyone may request <u>any number</u> of Masses during the week. Weekday Masses may be requested for anytime in 2021.
- As of December 1st, weekend Masses (Saturday at 4p, Sunday at 8a and 10a) are open through June 30, 2020.
- Weekend Masses for the second-half of the year (July 4th through December 26th) will become available Monday, April 19, 2021. Individuals may request two (2) weekend Masses January 3rd through June 27th and three (3) weekend Masses July 4th through December 26th).
- Mass requests will not be taken via e-mail or over the telephone.
- A \$15 stipend is due for each Mass intention at the time of the request.
- Canon Law states that a Pastor / Administrator of a Parish "is obliged to have one "Pro Populo" Mass (a Mass for the intentions of the people of his Parish) each Sunday and each Holy Day of Obligation." The Mass for the "People of the Parish" is not a filler Mass because no one has taken the intention. It is required (Canon 534, Code of Canon Law, 1983). At the Parish of Saint Michael the Archangel, this Mass is rotated through the weekend Masses.

In June 2021, if all the weekend Masses fill during the first half of the year, we will also begin to offer a multiple Mass intention (two individuals for one Mass) which will rotate through the weekend Masses (4:00p Vigil Mass, 8:00a Sunday Mass, 10a Sunday Mass.) Diocesan Policy allows for one (1) Mass a week to be a multi-intentioned Mass.

This policy is necessitated as a result of people who only request weekend Masses at the opening of the Mass Book each year. We are fortunate to have four (4) weekday and three (3) weekend Masses celebrated here each week, but 12 or more Masses requested per individual quickly fills the Book, especially the weekends. Hence, by mid-Spring to early-Summer, our weekend Mass Intentions were almost full. Thus, if Parishioners die mid-year to year-end, often there are no announced weekend Masses available for up to a year after their death and this is greatly upsetting to the surviving members of the family.

Before deciding on the above policy, a survey of Mass Book Intention policies of several parishes in the area was made. Bishop Sullivan and the Diocese of Camden issued guidelines regarding Mass intentions. Some Parishes only open their Mass Intentions a few months at a time. Some Parishes restrict the number of weekend and weekday requests that can be made in a given year. Many Parishes are struggling with the same issues that are being encountered here at the Parish of Saint Michael the Archangel.

We are doing all that is humanly possible to be fair and to accommodate everyone and to hopefully ensure that all of the Masses celebrated in the Parish have intentions.

Thank you for your understanding and kind cooperation in these matters!
