

STEWARDS - SEND ME

"Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, Whom shall I send? Who will go for us?' 'Here I am,' I said, 'send me!'" ~ Isaiah 6:8 ~

Every day, in little ways and in big ways, God asks, "Whom shall I send?" Whether it is someone to take on a new <u>Stewardship</u> ministry, to give a friendly smile to a stranger, or to say a word of encouragement to a friend, God constantly provides opportunities to help someone in need. God is always talking to us; we just need to pay more attention. When you hear God calling have the courage to walk through the door and say "Here I am, Lord."



Dear Parishioners,

All of us at times give in to our impulses. Retail stores count on this when they place certain items near the checkout counters — in our faces as we stand waiting in line. Sometimes acting on impulse is just fun, as when we skipped along the hopscotch boxes some child has drawn with chalk on the sidewalk. Sometimes acting on impulse has implications, as when we agree to do something and then find out much time and energy the task will actually take. Rarely, if ever, does acting on impulse have lifelong implications. The Gospel this weekend seems to be all about impulses … Jesus commands the fishermen to put out their nets in spite of laboring all night catching nothing. The fishermen leave all to follow Jesus. In these cases, their impulses most certainly have lifelong implications!

What precipitated the radical response of the first disciples who "left everything and followed" Jesus? Clearly, Jesus' words and actions had something to do with it. To fishermen who labored fruitlessly all night, Jesus says try again and it leads them to a great catch. To a sinful Peter who considers himself unworthy of Jesus' company, Jesus says "Follow Me," and transforms Peter's life purpose. More than one miracle has occurred in this weekend's Gospel.

Jesus "taught the crowds." The miracle of the great catch makes concrete the Good News of Jesus' teaching ... God's intervention overturning the futility of mere human work, the superabundance of God's actions on our behalf, and the invitation to follow in Jesus' footsteps. The miracle of the catch is the bridge to the second miracle ... hearing the Good News and living it. The miracle enabled the disciples to see more deeply into the truth of Jesus' teaching. It's the power of Jesus' Good News that drew them to follow Him. Today, we are the miracles that make the Good News visible when we allow God to work in us and through us.

Following Jesus can hardly be an impulse decision, although the Gospel account might make it seem that way. Between the miracle of the great catch and the disciples leaving everything to follow Jesus stands Peter's recognition that he is "a sinful man." Their encounter with Jesus helped the disciples see themselves for who they were and opened up the willingness to change their life course. They would still be fishermen – but now their catch would be human beings to whom they would tell the Good News of God's presence. Jesus is the net that God lowers into the sea of humanity ... knowing full well there will be a great catch.

For most of us, Jesus does not come in dramatic and miraculous ways and bid us to follow Him. Rather, He comes in the ordinary events of daily living. This weekend's Gospel invites us to look at the simple ways we live, the ways we have changed our purpose in life to follow Jesus – for example in the generosity of so many volunteers in our parish and in the community, in the faithfulness of husbands and wives, in the unselfishness of pastoral workers, in the uncomplaining suffering of the sick, in the gracious wisdom of the elderly ... in all of these instances we see faithful followers of Jesus living His teachings. Our "yes" response is to imitate these good behaviors, and by doing so we are faithful followers. Living the Paschal Mystery means we respond to God in these little, everyday things. The astonishing thing about this Good News is that we are all made worthy followers simply because God calls us.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

February 6, 2022 | Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 6:1-2a, 3-8 | 1 Cor 15:1-11 or 1 Cor 15:3-8, 11 | Lk 5:1-11

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

We put off all kinds of things for all kinds of reasons. I'll take that trip with my family once my schedule clears up. Someday I'll read that book collecting dust on my shelf. I'll volunteer at church once I get my own act together. Today's readings remind us that God will take us as we are: We need only say "yes." In each of the readings, the protagonists – Isaiah, Paul, and Peter – initially resist God's call, fearing their sinfulness disqualifies them. We may feel that way, too. However, in each case, God forgives their sins and gives them the grace to say, like Isaiah, "Here I am. Send me!" Their assent can be a challenge to those of us who hold back from becoming more involved in our parish or sharing our faith with others, fearing we aren't good enough or aren't an expert in theology. Jesus reminds us that it is ultimately not about *us*, but him. We don't have to be perfect, just willing to push past our fears and trust him to make disciples of us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's readings, we hear descriptions of Isaiah's lips touched by a burning ember, Paul being transformed from persecutor to preacher, and the fishermen dropping their nets to follow Jesus. In each case, that turning point led to a life of witness. We may not have such a dramatic story to share, but most of us can look back and see turning points: That influential teacher, the aunt who saw the best in us, a priest, sister, or retreat leader who spoke to our hearts. Today's readings can encourage us to be that person for others – the one who shows them the love of Christ and what a difference it can make. Buoyed by God's grace, we can share the Good News with others and accompany one another as we seek to follow Jesus in our day-to-day lives.



A New and Improved Garden Permit Program

We are delighted to share a couple of improvements to our Garden Permit Program! First, in an effort to be more flexible and provide greater service, we have extended the Garden Permit to be a yearlong program. Additionally, we have added

a new option, now called Garden Permit Prime, which gives families the option to select an enhanced landscape edging. The annual fee for the Garden Permit Prime is only \$50. The decision to offer both improvements is directly in response to feedback we have received from a number of our families.

Of course, South Jersey Catholic Cemeteries continues to offer the standard Garden Permit Program which includes black plastic landscape edging. We are happy to confirm that the annual fee for this option remains at \$35.

The Garden Permit Program allows for the planting of flowers in front of monument markers giving family members the ability to care for the final resting place of their loved one(s). These gardens are permitted under controlled circumstances and only where the spacing of the monuments allows for access of equipment. The Garden Permit Program begins every year on March 21, with the start of spring.

An application must be completed in order to participate in the 2022 program. Please note applications and payment must be received by March 15, 2022 in order to continue with the program for those who signed up in March of 2021.

Some more info about the parts of the Mass ...

X Confiteor

NEAR THE beginning of Mass, the community acknowledges its sinfulness and dependence on God's mercy. One option is for all to recite the Confiteor, the prayer that begins, "I confess to almighty God." As people admit their sin, they strike their breast.

The Confiteor is an old prayer, but its current placement in the Mass is an innovation. Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the priest recited the Confiteor by himself, one of several prayers at the foot of the altar that introduced the Mass, and the servers repeated it after him. The people prayed the Confiteor later, just before receiving Communion. This was because for many years, people did not receive Communion at Mass frequently. When they received Communion outside of Mass-for example, when they were sick—they said the Confiteor first. As Communion at Mass became more common, the Confiteor came with it. So essentially, a Communion service had been inserted into the priest's Mass, as if the people's Communion had nothing to do with the priest's Communion or the sacrifice preceding it. The priest even distributed Communion from the tabernacle rather than the newly consecrated bread and wine on the altar.

In the revisions of the Mass following the Council, the Confiteor became one of three options for the Penitential Act near the beginning of Mass. The Confiteor was removed from the Communion Rite, where it interrupted the natural flow of events. It remained at the beginning, but as one option rather than an obligatory prayer. It was offered to the entire assembly to recite rather than to the priest alone. This enabled everyone to participate in the Mass from the very start as the priestly people. One way people participate consciously is to acknowledge to one another and to God that they have sinned, to say aloud, "I confess."
