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

STEWARDSHIP FRUITFULNESS

"A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit." ~ Luke 6:43 ~

Are you living <u>Stewardship</u> by using your gifts in the way God intended? Have you asked God how He would like you to use them? Do you compare yourself to others and complain about what you don't have instead of being thankful for what you do have? God gives each of us unique gifts and a unique plan. Listen to how God is calling you to use your gifts, to bear good fruit, for the glory of His name.



Dear Parishioners.

Churchy people can often and easily be caught up in churchy things. What colors are we displaying for the season? What song is most appropriate at this time? What is the second reading and how does it connect to the first? But today we are reminded by Jesus that there are many things broader and perhaps more important than church or even religious identity. We are told not to be hypocritical, finding fault in others while overlooking our own. We are reminded to consider how one acts as an indication of one's true character.

Jesus' teaching and preaching was fundamental to His ministry. He was considered a sage and a prophet. His understanding of human beings moved the crowds. His insight into how we behave versus how we ought to behave, was often captured in brief, forceful, to-the-point, and quite often memorable sayings that were profound. And certainly after His Death and Resurrection, His teaching carried new meaning. In light of His undergoing the Paschal Mystery, He is the Son of God raised to new life. His words are more than homespun wisdom. They are light and life.

On Wednesday, we will enter into the season of Lent. As we think about what practice of penance we will embrace, it is often easier to come up with penances for our spouse, our children, our colleagues or friends than it is for ourselves. Jesus knew the human tendency to point out other people's faults. He counseled, "Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye."

We must take care that we don't live these next six (6) weeks like the other weeks of the year. Now begins a special kind of "training" - we should be redoubling our efforts to learn what Gospelliving means. Extra time faithfully spent in prayer, emptying ourselves through fasting so we hunger for God, being attentive to others – this is how we die to ourselves and live faithfully the Gospel.

Because our own transformation deepens our relationships, good choices for Lenten practices are those that really change us, and not just during Lent. In other words, simply "giving up" something and forgetting about the practice when Lent is over doesn't really help us to do what the Gospel is asking of us. Perhaps this year, you might invite a trusted friend or family member to help you in choosing a Lenten practice. Receive the feedback with an open mind and then ask God to help you discern what will be the most fruitful practice for you this Lenten season and beyond. Our Lenten penance must be directed to transformation (conversion) of self that is beyond Lent. Transformation makes a difference in our lives and in our relationships.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Parenthood can be humbling. When our children are young, we celebrate even the tiniest accomplishments: "You put on your socks!" or "Wow, good job putting your dish in the dishwasher!" And rightly so. Then come the teen years, and some of us can err on the side of criticism. "Why did you put off that project until the last minute?" "Turn off the electronics by 10 p.m. or else ..." "What, another energy drink?" (We say, looking up from our own phone with a cup of tea in hand ...) The same can be said of our spiritual lives. We want our children to pray and participate in the sacraments, but we may rush through Grace before meals, skip opportunities for confession, or treat holy Mass as an afterthought. Today's Gospel reminds us why our admonitions won't work if we don't walk our talk: The blind can't lead the blind. None of us is perfect, and neither are our children or the other people in our lives. But as our second reading reminds us, Jesus has won for us victory over sin. When we ask Jesus to help us remove the "wooden beam" from our own eyes, we can see his will for us more clearly and lift up those around us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We don't have to be perfect to encourage one another in our faith. Like the "good tree" Jesus describes in the parable and the tree that bears "good fruit" in Sirach, however, we need to nourish our faith before we can share it with others. It can start with something as simple as adding prayer to our morning routine. We can bring our flaws, our doubts, our bad habits to Jesus and ask him to free us from whatever might be holding us back. As we accompany others, whether it is those with whom we live, work, or worship, we can turn to Jesus to help us be a force for good. We will stumble. But as St. Paul reminds us, "Be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain."

PRAY Have you prayed The Examen? This Ignatian practice, often at the end of the day, encourages reflection — on God's presence in our day and the areas where we may have fallen short. We can ask the Lord for forgiveness and the grace to do better tomorrow.





LENTEN REGULATIONS

- The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are <u>Ash</u>
 <u>Wednesday</u> and <u>Good Friday</u>. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.
- On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted. Those
 who are between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.
- On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of Abstinence.
- The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially" (in other words, as a whole) is a serious obligation.
- The Fridays of the year outside of Lent are designated as days of Penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as Penance.
- The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (your Easter Duty) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, March 6, 2022 to the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, June 12, 2022. [The Paschal Precept is to receive Holy Communion during the Pascal Season. To receive Holy Communion, one must not be conscious of any grave sin. If you are conscious of grave sin, prior sacramental confession is needed. (Please see "Guidelines for the Reception of Holy Communion" in the Breaking Bread Missalettes in church, page 237, "For Catholics" 1996, USCCB.)
