Dear Parishioners,

When we limit what we are looking for, we limit what we might find. If we are only looking for coins with a metal detector, we might miss finding a primitive tool from the Iron Age. If we are only looking for a six-figure-salary job, we might miss the job that can be at hand to pay our immediate bills. If we are looking for a movie-star type Mr. or Mrs. Right, we may miss an opportunity to spend a lifetime with someone who loves deeply and faithfully. Life is limitless when our horizon of vision is expanded to include the unexpected and the extraordinary.

This weekend's Gospel has two central characters – John the Baptist and Jesus. The Gospel says marvelous things about both ... Jesus works to reverse the sad plight of humanity ... John is a prophet privileged to announce the coming of the Messiah. With this third Sunday of Advent, our attention is turned explicitly toward the Christmas mystery, but rather than an infant, we encounter the adult Jesus who is already about His saving ministry. If we are only looking for a baby in a manger, we will not be able to recognize what the Gospel is truly asking us to see ... Jesus the Messiah ... who brings about a reversal of the human plight. We who see and acknowledge this Jesus are blessed as John the Baptist was blessed.

Israel was patiently awaiting a conquering Messiah who would be their earthly king. The surprise of the Gospel is who the Messiah truly is – the tender and merciful servant who reaches out to those in need. In Jesus, the **whole** vision of God for a world of peace and harmony comes to fruition. An alternative world is present in the coming of this Jesus Messiah, a world far surpassing the wealth and might and power of earthly expectations. The world Jesus brings is a world in which all are blessed beyond what we look for or see – even beyond imagination.

The crowds went out in the desert to see a prophet. Jesus assures them they saw even more, and he extols John's greatness. Now, here is the real shock of the Gospel and the blessing: as great as John is – the one who follows Jesus – even the very least of these is still greater than John! <u>We</u> are those blessed ones who inherit the "kingdom of heaven," those of us who take up Jesus' tender and merciful servant ministry and continue to bring sight and healing and proclaim the Good News to all those <u>we</u> meet. Now it is our ministry to reverse the sad plight of humanity by helping others see in Jesus the One who brings blessing.

Let us see John for who he really is – the messenger pointing to the Messiah. Let us see Jesus for who He really is – the Messiah-king whose power is in His being the tender, merciful servant. Let us see ourselves for who we really are – God's blessed and beloved who, when we minister as Jesus did, are even greater than John the Baptist. Yes, seeing is believing – but only when we look beyond to the blessedness breaking upon us.

The patience admonished in the Second Reading is needed for us to look beyond our limited vision and to see what God offers us in Christ Jesus. If we limit our expectations to a baby born long ago in a manger, we will not be able to see Jesus as the "glory" and "splendor" of our God who is present among us – and within us – and whose presence continues to save. Through patience – first, with ourselves – we gradually learn to look beyond the immediate demands of the cares of our everyday lives to see the possibilities for change in our lives and in the lives of others.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

Today many of us light a rose Advent candle as we celebrate Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice," and today's readings hint at the joy of Christ's coming. Who among us can't relate to the concrete examples from the prophet Isaiah that give us many reasons for hope and joy as we anticipate Christ's birth. Those of us who have experienced fear or doubt find reassurance: "Be strong, fear not!" During the holidays when many will grieve those who have died this past year, we hear that "sorrow and mourning will flee." In today's Gospel, John the Baptist points us to the source of our joy in the person of Jesus Christ. As we continue to prepare for his coming, we can take comfort knowing that God is with us now and for eternity. As we hear in today's Psalm, "The Lord God keeps faith forever."



GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I am not a patient person. Waiting in the slow grocery line raises my heart rate, and I have to use cruise control in 35 mph zones (it works!). W Our Lady of Guadalupe

EACH DECEMBER 12 the Catholic Church honors Our Lady of Guadalupe. The feast recalls the day in 1531 when the Mexican peasant Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin, having seen a vision of the Blessed Virgin Mary at Tepeyac, yet having been rebuffed by the local bishop, obeyed Mary's command to pluck the roses that were impossibly growing in the rocky land during December. Bundling the flowers within his outer garment, Juan Diego returned to the bishop and opened his tilma to show the miracle of the roses. Then, to the wonderment of them both, the roses falling to the floor revealed an imprint of Our Lady on the very garment that bore the miraculous flowers.

Devotion to Our Lady of Guadalupe has spread throughout Mexico, Latin America, North America, and the world. Her image adorns churches, homes, meeting rooms, places of business, cars, and clothes. The tilma itself remains on display at a basilica in Mexico City, where it is the object of intense devotion. Although the date is not a holyday of obligation on the Church's calendar, it is practically observed that way among the Hispanic population.

Ceremonies in parishes typically include a Mass, a serenade of devotional music addressed to the Virgin, a theatrical presentation of the story of Juan Diego, and the lively dancing of matachines to the loud accompaniment of drums, all honoring the ower and love of Mary, especially her concern for the poor and the lowly.

In years when December 12 falls on a Sunday, the Mass is that of the Third Sunday of Advent, but it is still appropriate for those devoted to Our Lady of Guadalupe to include music, devotions, petitions, and preaching that commemorate this important day.

A Brief Examination of Conscience Based on the Ten Commandments

I am the Lord your God: you shall not have strange Gods before Me. Have I treated people, events, or things as more important than God?

You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain. Have my words, actively or passively, put down God, the Church, or people?

Remember to keep holy the Lord's Day. Do I go to Mass every Sunday (or Saturday Vigil) and on Holy Days of Obligation? Do I avoid, when possible, work that impedes worship to God, joy for the Lord's Day, and proper relaxation of mind and body? Do I look for ways to spend time with family or in service on Sunday?

Honor your father and your mother. Do I show my parents due respect? Do I seek to maintain good communication with my parents where possible? Do I criticize them for lacking skills I think they should have?

You shall not kill. Have I harmed another through physical, verbal, or emotional means, including gossip or manipulation of any kind?

You shall not commit adultery. Have I respected the physical and sexual dignity of others and of myself?

You shall not steal. Have I taken or wasted time or resources that belonged to another?

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. Have I gossiped, told lies, or embellished stories at the expense of another?

You shall not covet your neighbor's spouse. Have I honored my spouse with my full affection and exclusive love?

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods. Am I content with my own means and needs, or do I compare myself to others unnecessarily?




