

PSMA & Connect Giving

Is Online Giving Safe?

Online Giving meets the highest banking-level security standards set forth by the Payment Card Industry (PCI) to ensure safe and confidential transactions. In fact, your banking information is encrypted in the system and is not accessible to any users or administrators of the Online Giving system. When you manage your own account information, your church never needs to handle checks or worry about locking up documents containing your account information. And you'll always be certain that your gifts are direct-deposited into your church's account.

What are the advantages of Online Giving?

It makes it easy to give, even when you are unable to attend church. You never have to bring cash or checks to church. Giving electronically also helps the church save money and plan its budget!

How my contributions are automatically deducted from my account?

Once you complete the online registration form, the contribution amount you specify will automatically be transferred from your bank account to the church's bank account.

When will my contribution be deducted from my account?

Your electronic contribution will be debited on the date you specify on the "My Gifts" page of the Online Giving system.

If I do not write checks, how do I keep my checkbook balance straight?

Since your contribution is made at a pre-established time, you simply record it in your check register on the appropriate date. Electronic contributions are recorded for you on your bank statement as well as your online reports.

Without a canceled check, how can I prove I made my contribution?

Your bank statement and the Online Giving system both provide reports that document your electronic transactions.

Can I put different amounts in offerings and have all of them withdrawn at different times?

You can contribute to different offerings at different times; however, you will have to do each one separately. You will receive a receipt for each one.

What if I change bank accounts?

Log in and update your account information in the My Payment Methods window. Each checking/savings can be changed using the edit button, deleted completely, or new accounts can be added on the right side of the screen.

How much does Online Giving cost?

It costs you absolutely nothing! The parish pays the transactions fees charged by the company.

What if I try Online Giving and don't like it?

You can cancel your authorization by cancelling your gifts and donation dates at any time.

People who are facing or recovering from surgery, those who are seriously or chronically ill, individuals infirmed from old age, or those who may be in danger of passing are all welcome to request the Sacrament (Anointing) of the Sick, as well as visits for the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Communion.

Because of the HIPAA laws, hospitals, assisted-living facilities, nursing homes, and rehabilitation centers are not permitted to divulge the names of patients to clergy. While in the hospital, be sure to notify someone that you wish to be anointed and / or placed on the Communion list, usually coordinated by the hospital chaplain.

Please do not wait until the last minute to receive these Sacrament(s). The sick have a right to be able to seek and receive the graces of the Sacraments at the earliest and best opportunity while they can consciously express their faith and desires and fully participate in the sacrament.

5th Sunday of Lent March 29, 2020



Dear Parishioners,

Hindsight is always 20 / 20 and is usually filled with "If only ..." statements. If only I had studied harder, I might have done better on my test. If only I had not spent so much money eating out, I wouldn't be so far behind on my bills. If only I had paid more attention to the traffic signal, I wouldn't have a ticket to pay for running the light. If only I could lose a bit more weight, I would fit into all these clothes in my closet. If only ... If only ...

In this weekend's Gospel, both Martha and Mary greet Jesus with an "If only" statement. "Lord, if You had been here ..." They were thinking of the immediate situation. Jesus has proven over and over again that He has the power to heal. Their brother, Lazarus, is ill and dying. Why didn't Jesus, their dear friend, come and heal their brother? Why did Jesus wait two days to go to Bethany? The answer to these painful questions is that Jesus is thinking and acting beyond the immediate situation. There is more at stake than Lazarus recovering his health. If Jesus had chosen to go to Bethany when He was first called, He could have healed Lazarus. But this would have been a very different sign. The raising of Lazarus is a sign of a new revelation that death is not the final statement to the human condition. Ultimately, because of the possibility of resurrection, life is.

When you think about it, the raising of Lazarus has more to do with Jesus, with us, and with believing, than it has to do with Lazarus. Two deaths are evident in this Gospel – Lazarus', very clearly ("Lazarus has died") ... but also Jesus' impending dying. Thomas has an idea of this when he tells the other disciples after Jesus' decision to go to Bethany (near Jerusalem). "Let us also go to die with him." Thomas' presumption, however, is that death is a final end. Jesus works an even greater miracle than healing Lazarus. By raising him from the dead, He gives a clear sign that He has power over life and death. The raising of Lazarus is a new kind of statement about life. Jesus' sign in this miracle is the power of the Spirit ... take a look at the Second Reading, Rom 8:8-11 ... the power of the Spirit brings life out of death. The new life He brings is risen and eternal. The questions we need to think about are: "Do we believe this sign?" "Do we live like we believe it?" and "Are we willing, like Jesus, to stake our lives on it?"

Mary and Martha's long relationship with Jesus had brought them to believe in Him. It must be comforting to know that their belief was still less than perfect. So is ours. And, like Mary and Martha, our belief is strengthened by our encounters with Jesus. **Jesus' presence means new life.**

One conspicuous way we encounter Jesus is at Mass when we expressly take time out of our busy schedules to be present. Other prayer times during the day and week are also times when we consciously strive to encounter Jesus. Perhaps less evident as encounters with Jesus could be all those times when we meet Him through faith-strengthening and hope-giving encounters with other people. When our discouragement is lessened by a kind remark or when our sinfulness is forgiven by a smile and welcome, we encounter Jesus in the other person and are brought to new life. Jesus loves each of us as deeply as He loved Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. Be assured that He gives each one of us new life, too!

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

SACRAMENTAL INFORMATION ...

<u>The Sacrament of Baptism</u>: Held during the 4p Mass on Saturday; during the 8a or 10:45a Mass on Sunday. Also held after the 9a Mass on Saturday morning or at 12 noon on Sunday at the convenience of the family.

<u>Pre-Baptism Class</u>: Required for parents / guardians who have not attended a class in the previous two (2) years. The Parish of Saint Michael the Archangel offers its class throughout the year on the third (3rd) Monday of the month at 7p in the Rectory Conference Room. Please call the Parish Office <u>at least two (2) weeks</u> in advance to register for a class.

<u>Funerals</u>: To be arranged through the Funeral Home of your choice. Your Funeral Director will contact the church.

<u>Sacrament of the Sick:</u> Anytime, however, due to the HIPAA Privacy Act, the individual needing the Sacrament or a family member needs to call the Parish.

Communion to the Sick / Homebound: Please call the Parish Office.

<u>Marriage</u>: Arrangements should be made one (1) year in advance, *prior to making any reception plans*.

Certificates of Eligibility: For those asked to be a Godparent or Sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. Canon law (Church law) requires that you need to be at least sixteen (16) years of age, have received all of the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, First Communion, and Confirmation). You are living a chaste life (not living with someone) and, if married, you were married according to the laws and teachings of the Catholic Church. Finally, you are a practicing Catholic, registered in the Parish and actively participate in the Sacramental life of the Church (you attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days). Certificates of Eligibility are given by the church where you are registered and active, not where you made your Sacraments. If you are an adult still living at home, it is a great idea to register in your parish under your own name, not simply to be registered under your parents.
