# Dear Parishioners,

Water is the most abundant substance on the earth. We drink it, we wash with it, we play in it, we transport on it, we grow food with it, we dilute with it, and we even sit on a shore and dream with it. Consider any given day and how often water comes into play. Yet unless the water is shut off to our homes or places of work, we seldom think about it. It's just there – everywhere and all the time. Water is so easy to take for granted. Given the substance and usefulness of water, it ought to be no surprise that our first Sacrament of Initiation, Baptism, uses water as its primary symbol. And just like the water around us, we can so easily take our Baptism (and often our other Sacraments) for granted. This weekend's festival and Gospel can be a reminder for each one of us that we can never take either water or our Baptism for granted. Too much is at stake.

Jesus comes to John, who is baptizing in the River Jordan. John is pointing to a baptism greater than his and to a person greater than he. Jesus asks John to baptize Him in order to "fulfill all righteousness" and thus show forth His continuity with the tradition in which John stands. But more happens. When the heavens open, the Spirit descends like a dove and Jesus is announced as the "beloved Son," a new tradition is born, and humanity's relationship with God is changed forever. We who are baptized into Christ become God's beloved sons and daughters, and God is "well-pleased" with each of us, too ... especially when we are faithful to our relationship with God and with one another. Through Baptism, we are invited into this new tradition.

Baptism inaugurates us into a Spirit-filled tradition where a new covenantal relationship with God becomes possible. We are invited into a union with God's "beloved Son" that confers on us His identity, His going "about doing good" (Second Reading), His intimate relationship with His Father. We cannot take our Baptism for granted because it is not simply a ritual that happens and is finished, but it is a relationship and a way of life to be lived.

Plunged into the baptismal waters, we die to our old self. As we rise from the waters, we enter into the new Life Baptism promises. Baptism inaugurates us into the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ. It inaugurates us into His way of life, one totally taken up with bringing healing and freedom (see First Reading) to those we meet in our daily living.

This dying and rising is the "stuff" of our Christian living. What enables us to continue to say yes to such living is that we know the dying always leads to rising. Death always brings Life. We know this with certainty because Jesus was baptized, His identity as the beloved Son was revealed, He was faithful to His mission to bring forgiveness and justice, and He died and then rose. The pattern of Jesus' life is the pattern of our own lives.

Paschal Mystery living is as concrete as Jesus' life and mission. For example, like Jesus, we are living justly when we die to selfishness and rise to the needs of others. Like Jesus, we "show no partiality" (Second Reading) when we die to judgments and categorizing or labeling others and rise to seeing all people as beloved children of God. Like Jesus, we do good when we forgive, we heal when we offer kind words instead of words that tear down, or help another without being asked. Our Baptism is ongoing in our lives when we live the greatness John recognized in Jesus. Ask yourselves this: if John were alive today, would he see that same greatness in us?

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!


