

PSMA & Connect Giving

Is Online Giving Safe?

Online Giving meets the highest banking-level security standards set forth by the Payment Card Industry (PCI) to ensure safe and confidential transactions. In fact, your banking information is encrypted in the system and is not accessible to any users or administrators of the Online Giving system. When you manage your own account information, your church never needs to handle checks or worry about locking up documents containing your account information. And you'll always be certain that your gifts are direct-deposited into your church's account.

What are the advantages of Online Giving?

It makes it easy to give, even when you are unable to attend church. You never have to bring cash or checks to church. Giving electronically also helps the church save money and plan its budget!

How my contributions are automatically deducted from my account?

Once you complete the online registration form, the contribution amount you specify will automatically be transferred from your bank account to the church's bank account.

When will my contribution be deducted from my account?

Your electronic contribution will be debited on the date you specify on the "My Gifts" page of the Online Giving system.

If I do not write checks, how do I keep my checkbook balance straight?

Since your contribution is made at a pre-established time, you simply record it in your check register on the appropriate date. Electronic contributions are recorded for you on your bank statement as well as your online reports.

Without a canceled check, how can I prove I made my contribution?

Your bank statement and the Online Giving system both provide reports that document your electronic transactions.

Can I put different amounts in offerings and have all of them withdrawn at different times?

You can contribute to different offerings at different times; however, you will have to do each one separately. You will receive a receipt for each one.

What if I change bank accounts?

Log in and update your account information in the My Payment Methods window. Each checking/savings can be changed using the edit button, deleted completely, or new accounts can be added on the right side of the screen.

How much does Online Giving cost?

It costs you absolutely nothing! The parish pays the transactions fees charged by the company.

What if I try Online Giving and don't like it?

You can cancel your authorization by cancelling your gifts and donation dates at any time.

CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED! ALLELUIA! ALLELUIA!

I never would have thought in a million years that I would not have spent all of last week, Holy Week, and today, Easter Sunday, outside of a church ... most definitely as a Priest and most certainly as a Catholic / Christian ... and yet that is the reality of the COVID-19 pandemic.

On that first Easter, Mary went to the tomb "early in the morning while it was still dark." When she arrived, she saw the stone rolled back and nothing but emptiness, no doubt reinforcing the darkness and sadness in her heart. Maybe like the way we feel, not being able to celebrate one of the central mysteries of our faith. It would take an encounter with the risen One for Mary and for the other disciples to understand that Jesus had risen. And then their darkness would give way to glory, to light, to Life, to believing, to unmitigated joy. Emptiness would become fullness. He has risen! And today, more than 2,000 years later, on this Easter 2020, our faith tells us Jesus, our Savior, has indeed risen and no viral pandemic can tell us differently! Jesus Christ, our Savior, is risen today!

An empty home means empty hearts. A full house means happy hearts. An empty tomb means empty hearts ... but no ... it doesn't. Mary found an empty tomb and ran to find Peter and the beloved disciple and spoke from an empty heart. She thought the dead body of her Teacher had been stolen. Those first witnesses had not yet come to understanding. But the empty tomb also gave birth to hopeful hearts ... hearts ready to believe even though they did not understand. Hearts that would become filled with the glory of risen life.

Perhaps more than any other Easter Gospel, this one can speak to us in the light of the COVID-19 pandemic. Unlike the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, and the next account in Saint John where there is an angelic presence announcing Jesus' Resurrection and Jesus Himself appears to Mary Magdalene and the disciples, this account only leaves us with hints of the Resurrection. We also have the Scriptures that tell us that "He had to rise from the dead." Like the disciples in this account, we have no immediate evidence of Jesus' Resurrection. Rather, that glorious event is mediated to us in the same way it was for those disciples long ago. For us, Jesus' risen Presence is mediated through witness-disciples who by their Gospel living announce that Jesus is alive and with us, who announce Jesus' glorious risen Presence by the way that they live. Consider those working in healthcare or stocking the shelves at our food store to make sure we have the basic necessities, for instance.

Seeing and believing, we still do not always understand. This seeming contradiction characterizes the Christian journey. Through the Scriptures and by the witness of faithful disciples, we gradually learn to encounter Jesus in the ordinary (or extraordinary) circumstances of everyday living in the midst of pandemic ... seeing His risen Presence in the goodness of others, in our worship and prayer, even though it may be live-streamed, even in our very needs. This current situation, I believe, will ultimately lead to a strengthened faith in our risen Lord. I believe that it will show us that He has not died in vain and that we even now share in the new Life Jesus' Resurrection promises.

At the same time, we do not understand. This does not mean we do not believe in the Resurrection. It means that the Resurrection event is so singular, so unique, so unexpected, so glorious that it cannot be grasped in one encounter. We will spend our lifetimes growing in our appreciation that Jesus lived, suffered, died, and was raised from the dead. We spend our lifetime grasping that, even though all of us still must face physical death. We know that Christ has been victorious over death. By death, He conquered death. And to those in the graves, He granted life. Like the disciples, we run all our lives to encounter Christ's glorious Presence, to announce the Good News that suffering and death is not all there is to our life. Like the early disciples, we cannot contain ourselves. We run to meet the risen Christ in others and empty ourselves so that others can meet the risen Christ within us. The mystery is beyond us at the same time it is within us! The Lord is truly risen! What a glorious morn this darkness gives way to!

As I continue to remember all of you in prayer daily, may I ask a continued remembrance in your prayers as well?

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe on this Easter day and always!

For both: white crew socks




