

#### Dear Parishioners,

"Grown Men Don't Cry" has been a witticism around for a long time ... popular enough to have been a TV show and a song. In truth, however, it is regularly called into question. Loving husbands and fathers about to be separated for a time from their families do cry. Sons and grandsons cry at funerals. To be honest, I shed more than a few tears over the past three months, especially during Holy Week and Easter when I couldn't commemorate / celebrate those events with all of you. And then there was Mother's Day when I tried visiting my mother's grave in the cemetery and was turned away because the cemetery was "closed" due to the COVID-19 pandemic. I believe men cry because they experience a loss of the nearness of those they love deeply. When we love, we choose to be near the beloved. And even when separation occurs, steps are usually taken to assure some modem of nearness is continued. I remember when my Dad was away on a business trip. He called home frequently. (Today, he probably would have texted.) While I've never used them myself, Skype or Facetime can bring a sense of nearness to loved ones. Pictures and other mementos of a deceased person can keep that person near in spirit. Similarly, we seek the experience of God's nearness and God's abiding and overwhelming love for us. To the extent that we love God, we attend church and seek the divine Presence and communion with Him through the Sacraments. Kind of hard these past three months with closed churches and live-streaming, huh?

God came down in a cloud on Mount Sinai, drawing near to Moses and revealing the divine Self to him as merciful, gracious, kind, and faithful (see this weekend's First Reading Ex 34:4b-6, 8-9). Yet even this wonderful divine self-revelation was exceeded when God "gave His only-begotten Son" (see this weekend's Gospel Jn 3:16-18) so that we might be saved. But even more, the fullest revelation of the grace, love, and fellowship of the Trinity (see this weekend's Second Reading 2 Cor 13:11-13) is extended to us believers with the sending of the Spirit as a share in divine intimacy – eternal Life itself (again, see this weekend's Gospel). God chooses to be very near to us.

God's desire is that we share in divine Life eternally. To this end, God is very near – near to Moses on Mount Sinai (First Reading) and near to us in the divine Son who came to dwell with us (the Incarnation). Even more ... for those who believe ... our triune God dwells within us by grace and communion, drawing us into the inner Life of the Trinity. The unceasing Life of the Trinity is this ... to love us into eternal Life. It is God's gracious gift ... and by virtue of the free will He also gave us, ours to choose or to refuse.

In this is eternal Life ... to be absorbed into the very Persons of God. The response to such a gift from our triune God is that of Moses ... "at once [bow] down to the ground in worship" (First Reading). This mystery of the Trinity, then, does not so much challenge us to understanding as it challenges us to a worshipful response to God's utter goodness and Presence to us ... to God's love and nearness.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity is a wonderful event celebrating the Life and majesty of God. As this weekend's Responsorial Psalm (Dn 3:52, 53, 54, 55) prompts us, we sing out our blessings and praises in face of God's "holy glory." At the same time that we are uplifted in praise, we are also brought down to earth by this Solemnity, for it reminds us that the only way we share in God's glory is to give ourselves in the same way God gives to us ... in love and mercy ... in graciousness and faithfulness ... in nearness and communion.


This weekend's Second Reading (2 Cor 13:11-13) give us concrete examples of what it means even now to live this kind of divine self-giving ... "rejoice," "mend your ways," "encourage one another," "agree with one another," "live in peace," "greet one another with a holy kiss." Amazingly, our simple, good, everyday actions toward one another express the very Life of God and God's desire to be near to us. The mystery of the Trinity will always be a mystery. Nevertheless, we ourselves are privileged to express the wonder of divine Life through our own goodness, mercy, love, and peace ... by what we say, by what we do, and by how we treat others.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe on this day commemorating God ... Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and always!

Be with us, Lord.

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


