

Dear Parishioners,

Gates can reveal a lot about what is beyond them. A broken-down, vine-covered gate suggests an abandoned house or one where the occupants don't care much about keeping up their property and appearances. An easy-swinging gate suggests that many people pass through it. A decorative gate with an artistic "Welcome" sign suggests that whatever lies beyond is pleasant and hospitable. The word "gate" appears five (5) times in this weekend's Gospel. Twice, it is personified. Twice, Jesus says, "I am the gate." Jesus is ever the compassionate, welcoming, protecting gate. That He is the gate suggests that what is beyond is more than pleasant and hospitable – what is beyond is eternal life ... abundant Life ... His risen Life.

On this fourth Sunday of Easter, the sixth Sunday since COVID-19 stopped our public Masses, we celebrate what we have traditionally called "Good Shepherd Sunday." This Gospel is particularly interesting in that the image of Jesus this Sunday is not that of a shepherd, but that of a gate. The image of the gate directs our attention to Jesus Christ as the risen One who always recognizes us and cares for us. Yes, Jesus is the Good Shepherd. The wide-open gate is the goodness of the Shepherd. The twist of the Gospel is that the gate is also a symbol for the Shepherd and how the Shepherd acts toward us – the gate itself is a metaphor for the care that Jesus gives us ... His openness to call and welcome everyone ... His desire to protect and guard us. Thus, the Gate (the Good Shepherd) invites us to cross through ... to enter the safety and protection that He offers. The Gate opens up a space of security, peace, and protection ... "Whoever enters through Me will be saved." This is where resurrection faith calls us to enter the Gate ... "that we might have life and have it more abundantly." Jesus states clearly that He came so that His followers might have abundant Life. Jesus uses the metaphor of a caring shepherd and his sheep to indicate how His followers might receive that Life ... by hearing His voice and their name ... by following the Good Shepherd ... by recognizing whose voice calls them. Hearing, following, recognizing ... we are to open our ears in faith ... open our hearts in trust ... open our minds in love. This is the way to abundant Life. The Gate is wide open, and we have a choice. Will we choose to enter?

This weekend's Gospel assures us that the risen One, the Good Shepherd, is truly there for us. He calls us by name. He leads us to abundant Life. For Jesus to call us by name supposes that He knows us – knows us intimately enough to call us by our name. Ask yourselves this ... *Does He?* This is a personal call. Each one of us is significant to the Good Shepherd. He cares for each one of us individually, by name, not as strangers. *Do we acknowledge the call, or do we ignore it?*

Thus, does Jesus model for us how we, too, are to be both gate and shepherd for others. The Second Reading from the First Letter of Saint Peter (1 Pet 2:20b-25), gives us a practical blueprint for our shepherding ... patience in suffering, doing good, return no insult or threat, hand ourselves over for the good of others. In these ways our own gate must be wide open. This may seem to be demanding. It is. However, Jesus is always there, walking "ahead of" us. guiding us toward being good shepherds ourselves.

We are reminded this Sunday that our simple, everyday actions of being faithful to the Gospel are how we live out our Baptismal promises ... our entry into following Jesus (see First Reading Acts 2:14a, 36-41). When we embrace our Baptismal commitment, we enter through Jesus the Gate into a life of being gate and shepherds ourselves.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe on this Easter day and always!

PSMA & Connect Giving

Is Online Giving Safe?

Online Giving meets the highest banking-level security standards set forth by the Payment Card Industry (PCI) to ensure safe and confidential transactions. In fact, your banking information is encrypted in the system and is not accessible to any users or administrators of the Online Giving system. When you manage your own account information, your church never needs to handle checks or worry about locking up documents containing your account information. And you'll always be certain that your gifts are direct-deposited into your church's account.

What are the advantages of Online Giving?

It makes it easy to give, even when you are unable to attend church. You never have to bring cash or checks to church. Giving electronically also helps the church save money and plan its budget!

How my contributions are automatically deducted from my account?

Once you complete the online registration form, the contribution amount you specify will automatically be transferred from your bank account to the church's bank account.

When will my contribution be deducted from my account?

Your electronic contribution will be debited on the date you specify on the "My Gifts" page of the Online Giving system.

If I do not write checks, how do I keep my checkbook balance straight?

Since your contribution is made at a pre-established time, you simply record it in your check register on the appropriate date. Electronic contributions are recorded for you on your bank statement as well as your online reports.

Without a canceled check, how can I prove I made my contribution?

Your bank statement and the Online Giving system both provide reports that document your electronic transactions.

Can I put different amounts in offerings and have all of them withdrawn at different times?

You can contribute to different offerings at different times; however, you will have to do each one separately. You will receive a receipt for each one.

What if I change bank accounts?

Log in and update your account information in the My Payment Methods window. Each checking/savings can be changed using the edit button, deleted completely, or new accounts can be added on the right side of the

How much does Online Giving cost?

It costs you absolutely nothing! The parish pays the transactions fees charged by the company.

What if I try Online Giving and don't like it?

You can cancel your authorization by cancelling your gifts and donation dates at any time.

AMEN


