



STEWARDSHIP CHARISMS

"He said to them, 'The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few..."

~ Luke 10:2 ~

As Catholics, we are all called to serve. Each of us has been given "charisms" otherwise known as gifts from the Holy Spirit to help build God's Church. Our charisms can only be used for good. We know that we are using them in the right ministry when we are filled with joy and we want to share stories about our charitable works. Discern how God is calling you to <u>Stewardship</u> using your charisms. Say "yes" to what God is calling you to do and then do it! Share your joy and invite others to do the same.



Dear Parishioners.

Some of us, when we have many tasks to do on a given day, make out a list and cross off each task as it is completed. Ah! How good it feels to see our list of ten tasks now with just seven, now three, then one and complete. To give ourselves a boost, we might prioritize our list and begin with the easiest jobs that are most quickly accomplished. Thus in the first hour or so, we might cross off four items or so and this gives us a boost for tackling the rest of our more difficult challenges. This weekend's Gospel talks about labors – but there is no list. There is no prioritizing to begin with easy tasks. Jesus sends us out on a challenging, difficult task. This task cannot be accomplished in a single day, but requires a lifetime of faithful labor.

Jesus sends the disciples out to plant the seed of the Good News and harvest its fruit of peace and the in-breaking of the Kingdom of God. The "Kingdom of God is at hand" because whenever disciples are present and received, God is present and received. Despite the disciples facing "wolves" and sometimes being rejected, their labor will bear fruit for it is God's power that works through them. It is ultimately God's work.

Isaiah's vision in the First Reading uses different images to describe the same reality presented in the Gospel. The fruit of the disciples' labors (peace, healing, and God's Kingdom at hand) are described in the Scripture passage from Isaiah as comfort, abundance, and prosperity. Both readings envision God's power and presence now and a future when our "heart(s) shall rejoice." In Isaiah, however, the future is not yet a reality for Israel. It is a reality for the disciples. Isaiah's wonderful future is being fulfilled in Christ ... in each one of us.

Jesus admonishes them not to keep their sights on the things they've accomplished, but on a future glory which still awaits them. The harvest is not what they did in accomplishing healing and casting out demons. The harvest Jesus sends His disciples out to bring in is the larger, even more abundant harvest of heaven. This labor is never our own alone. Without the Power given us by Jesus – the indwelling of the Holy Spirit – we would not labor fruitfully. For this divine power and presence the disciples – and we – *rejoice*.

The disciples' journey to Jerusalem includes both dying and rising. When we describe the Paschal Mystery journey and Gospel living as dying and rising, we are using a metaphor which has any number of interpretations and applications. In this weekend's context of discipleship, we are saying that ministry brings us to a kind of dying (the pain of the disciple when others don't accept the Gospel) as well as rising (the rejoicing that is ours because we are doing the work of God). The end of the journey in Jerusalem brings both dying and rising, too ... the Cross and Jesus' Resurrection. If the journey is undertaken alone ... we will fail. We are successful, however, when the journey is faithful to Jesus' ministry and we are open to the Power – the Holy Spirit dwelling within us – given us.

Any faithful discipleship and Gospel living calls for an openness to God's presence to us. Part of our ministry, then, and of living the dying and rising mystery is to spend time every day in prayer being attentive to God's presence, the gifts God give us to be successful, and the power of the Holy Spirit which washes over us. This kind of prayer helps us remember that the ministry is not ours. It is Christ's.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us!

Crying Babies

THE NOISE created by crying babies at church is second only to the noise created by people debating whether or not the babies belong there.

On one hand, babies can disturb the whole proceedings. They draw attention to themselves and away from the liturgy. They make it hard to hear and harder to concentrate. Those whose hearing is impaired especially suffer.

On the other hand, babies are part of the family. They belong with their parents, and because we've baptized them into the community, they belong with us.

Some parishes offer cry rooms. They provide a place for babies to scream their lungs out, but they also remove parents from the worshiping assembly. Adults in the cry room looking at Mass through a glass window might just as well be watching it on big-screen TV.

Other parishes offer babysitting. This permits parents to bring their children to church but entrust them to the trained care of someone who can give them full attention.

If you are the parent of a crying baby at church, your child's care comes first. If you need to get up, walk around, leave for a while, or offer some other comfort to your baby, do it. Your actions will not be any more disturbing than your baby's tears. Your demonstration of love will inspire others to charity.

If you are near the parents of a crying baby, offer to help. They might appreciate your support, especially if they're watching another child.

And if you are frustrated because you cannot hear over the din and no one's doing anything about it, do your best. As with any distraction that challenges our prayer, pray with it, for it, and through it. If it keeps you from praying the way you would like, pray the way you can. God will understand.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

So what comes to mind when you imagine your dream road trip? A well-planned route with scenic stops, nice hotels, good restaurants and quirky sights along the way? Jesus may be my copilot, but given his words in today's Gospel I'm not sure I'd want him to be my travel agent! As he sends the 72 ahead of him, he gives them no illusions about the mission that lies ahead: "Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves. Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals." Settle for the first house that welcomes you, regardless of the amenities. Eat and drink whatever they offer. Give those you encounter a greeting of peace and remind them the kingdom of God is at hand. As always, Jesus gives these travelers all they will need to share the Good News with others. They return rejoicing! The early disciples refute my "travel agent" doubts, as they show us by example to place our trust in God and take nothing for the journey except our faith and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. In doing so, we can rest assured that our "names are written in heaven."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I'm a planner. When we went to Disney World, my sons split off from me after I unveiled an app that would show us exactly which ride or attraction to hit based on crowd numbers, time of day and other variables. I loved that app! So had I been one of the 72 we read about today appointed by Jesus to spread the Gospel in pairs, hopefully my companion would not have abandoned me because of my insistence on planning. Ultimately, our journey of faith – as we share it with others and walk toward the kingdom ourselves – is not something we can choreograph. The more we plan and the more baggage we carry, the less likely we are to hear God's voice cutting through the noise. By stripping away the non-essentials, we can place our trust in the Lord, who will show us the right path. When we place our lives in the service of the Lord, the harvest will be abundant.

PRAY Many U.S. dioceses will be welcoming newly ordained priests this month. Pray for them as they begin their ministry, and pray for more vocations.
